Mission Statement • The mission of Beyond the Books Educational Foundation is to fund innovative enrichment programs for the students of McLean County Unit District No. 5 and Bloomington District 87 Public Schools.

How is the Foundation Structured? • Beyond The Books Educational Foundation is a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) Illinois corporation that was formed in 1992. Its purpose is to provide a long-term, self-sustaining financial base that will annually fund innovative academic programs in District 87 and Unit 5 public schools. All work of the Foundation is accomplished by private citizens who serve without salary as the Board of Directors. Annually, the Board elects officers and directors, reviews policies and practices, evaluates the funded projects and conducts a financial audit. The Boards of Education of Unit 5 and District 87 encouraged the formation of the Foundation and strongly support its efforts ... a partnership for innovation in public education.

What is the Process for Awarding Grants? • Each winter, educators in both District 87 and Unit 5 are invited to submit a written grant application which describes the project, method of implementation, cost estimate and the value of the program to students. Applications are reviewed by the Beyond the Books Educational Foundation Board of Directors and funding is awarded according to established criteria. The selected programs are implemented the following school year.

What Kinds of Enrichment Programs are Funded? • The objective of Beyond The Books Educational Foundation is to fund innovative programs (which are not currently offered) that enhance educational experiences. The Foundation is committed to educational excellence in the core academic areas, the arts and humanities, sciences, and technology. All age levels and areas of study are considered.

What is the Financial Goal of the Foundation? • Beyond The Books Educational Foundation is working toward growing its endowment fund to provide funding for all eligible grants. The ongoing financial commitment of contributors to the Foundation can enable our children and our community to become the best they can be.



Calendar Year 2020 Expense Summary for Annual Report






Grant Applications and Awards

In 2020, Beyond the Books Educational Foundation received 65 grant applications from educators in Unit 5 and District 87, requesting a total of *\$140,983*. Of those 65 applications, *35* projects were awarded a total of *\$68,748*.

Since 1992, \$783,833 has been awarded to support 849 projects.

Students will be able to explore the science behind how water and weathering affects earth's materials. They can discover the importance of a variety of freshwater ecosystems. Educators can demonstrate a wide range of Earth Science concepts interactively. For instance, they can show and encourage students to build the varied land-forms found on Earth's surface and illustrate how they were created by a variety of processes such as flooding, erosion, tectonics, and glaciations.

The grant funds will make it possible to purchase an augmented reality sandbox that will be used by students of the entire school, kindergarten through fifth grade in the subject areas of science, social studies, math, and language arts. The concepts and scenarios are kept simple for the younger students, by discussing contour lines, mountains, valleys, watersheds and water flow. When engaging older students the scenarios and concepts become more complex and the learning experience can include discussions of land-forms, elevation, and best land management practice and processes.

"The use of technology increases student engagement and helps make learning more meaningful and fun. Students can actually be the ones in charge of their own learning through this hands-on tool. Through their own research, thoughts and plans, they will be able to create anything from the tallest mountains to the smallest rainstorms all based on the student's imagination."
