Mission Statement • The mission of Beyond the Books Educational Foundation is to fund innovative enrichment programs for the students of McLean County Unit District No. 5 and Bloomington District 87 Public Schools.

How is the Foundation Structured? • Beyond The Books Educational Foundation is a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) Illinois corporation that was formed in 1992. Its purpose is to provide a long-term, self-sustaining financial base that will annually fund innovative academic programs in District 87 and Unit 5 public schools. All work of the Foundation is accomplished by private citizens who serve without salary as the Board of Directors. Annually, the Board elects officers and directors, reviews policies and practices, evaluates the funded projects and conducts a financial audit. The Boards of Education of Unit 5 and District 87 encouraged the formation of the Foundation and strongly support its efforts ... a partnership for innovation in public education.

What is the Process for Awarding Grants? • Each winter, educators in both District 87 and Unit 5 are invited to submit a written grant application which describes the project, method of implementation, cost estimate and the value of the program to students. Applications are reviewed by the Beyond the Books Educational Foundation Board of Directors and funding is awarded according to established criteria. The selected programs are implemented the following school year.

What Kinds of Enrichment Programs are Funded? • The objective of Beyond The Books Educational Foundation is to fund innovative programs (which are not currently offered) that enhance educational experiences. The Foundation is committed to educational excellence in the core academic areas, the arts and humanities, sciences, and technology. All age levels and areas of study are considered.

What is the Financial Goal of the Foundation? • Beyond The Books Educational Foundation is working toward growing its endowment fund to provide funding for all eligible grants. The ongoing financial commitment of contributors to the Foundation can enable our children and our community to become the best they can be.




Calendar Year 2021 Revenue Summary for Annual Report

Calendar Year 2021 Expense Summary for Annual Report






Grant Applications and Awards

In 2021, Beyond the Books Educational Foundation received 63 grant applications from educators in Unit 5 and District 87, requesting a total of *\$119,338*. Of those 63 applications, *44* projects were awarded a total of *\$76,276*.

Since 1992, \$806,109 has been awarded to support 893 projects.

The grant funds will make it possible to renovate and expand the greenhouse to create a dedicated space for the agriscience program. When NCHS was initially constructed, a greenhouse was built even though agriscience was not part of the curriculum at that time. About a decade later, an agriscience program was developed and it was quickly realized that greenhouse structure was missing many mechanics to make it function. Currently, the space is not effective for the advancement of the program. The goal of this grant is to provide a functional space that can be used by all students enrolled in the agriscience program over time (approximately 275 per school year).

As Harris wrote in her grant submission, "This project will have direct impact on the achievement of students in agriscience program in various ways, including: access to a laboratory space, real-world experience in creating a business plan, marketing, sales, and financial statements, and to experience learned concepts of anumal health and nutrition through a pig from the agriscience teacher's farm."
